SERMON NOTES

Preached by Pastor Phil on Sunday, May 24th.

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Are you familiar with the prophet, Samuel? He was the last judge and prophet of Israel who inaugurated the period of the kings. He was born in a time of great difficulty for Israel and can be compared to Moses, who saved the people of Israel from their slavery in Egypt; Samuel was the person whom God used to restore Israel to Himself during the period of the judges. If we think about it, for such a time that we ourselves are going through at this time, perhaps we need someone like Samuel in our midst.

Samuel's story begins with the story of Hannah. Hannah was barren, and because of this, she went alone to a place of worship to pray. Typically, prayers at that time would involve some kind of ritual or sacrifice. But for Hannah, she goes beyond the ritual and goes directly before God to pour out her heart. God hears this prayer, and grants her a son whom she names, "Samuel". The name "Samuel" literally means "God heard me". One thing we must remember when we read the book of Samuel is that **God hears our prayers**. When Hannah was crying out due to her childlessness, and when the Israelites were suffering as slaves in Egypt, God heard them (Exodus 3:7). So we see that God surely hears our prayers. However, we must remember that He also wants *us* to be attentive to *His* voice. for this is the way we can build a relationship with Him.

In English the two words "hear" and "listen" are separate and mean different things. But in the Hebrew language, a single word bears both meanings: the Hebrew word *shema* embodies both "to hear" as well as "to listen". God trained Samuel as a young boy to "hear and listen to" His voice. Three times He called Samuel, but Samuel did not recognize it as the voice of God. At the fourth time, he finally understands that God had been calling him and responds, "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Sam 3:10). As you read the book of Samuel, you will find that Samuel plays the role of listening to God's voice and relaying that message to the people. But even Samuel did not recognize God's voice from the beginning – he needed practice. *We need to practice hearing and listening to the voice of God.* How do we do this? Matthew 5:8 says, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God." **Our practice of listening to God begins with having a pure heart.**

The word *shema* also includes the aspect of obedience. Oftentimes, we have the wrong idea of what it means to obey God's voice. When king Saul had won the battle against the Amalekites (1 Sam 15:1-3), he spared their king and all the best of their livestock. Samuel rebuked Saul for this, because he had disobeyed God's command to spare absolutely nothing. Saul had thought that God will delight in the sacrifices he was going to make with the Amalekites' livestock. But when Samuel hears the sound of the animals, he expresses God's angered heart to Saul and reminds him that "to obey is better than sacrifice" (1 Sam 15:22). Listening to God's voice is more important than following a ritual of worship. To put it into our context today, for us to simply attend a worship service is not the same as listening to God's voice.

Do you hear the voice of God? Are you listening to it? It's okay if you don't hear it right away; even Samuel had to practice recognizing the voice of God. As we continue to live through this season of suffering, my prayer is that it can become a time where we each practice hearing, listening to, and obeying God's voice. Pray that God will grant us a *pure heart*, and that He would help us *practice* listening to His voice.
