A Missional Life

Not being able to go to Lummi last year felt weird. My annual routine of going to missions was suddenly broken. It felt like something was missing, and, more precisely, there appeared a gap in my "Christian resume" that I would update every year. You might have had a similar thought when you reflect on your spiritual life. It's clear that God wants us to live a missional life, but what does that look like? What is missional living?

In Matthew 8:1-4, we see Jesus healing a leper. If we simply stopped there, we could say that Jesus accomplished missionary work. But Jesus' work didn't end there; Jesus shows us that ministry work extends to daily encounters, as He travels throughout Galilee to teach, preach, and heal people. The same is for us; we are called to live missionally wherever we are, whether it's at school, home, church, or even online.

Now let's look closer at Jesus' encounter with the leper. Before healing him, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him (v.3). This is what I think we forget the most when trying to live out a missional life: we miss the relational aspect of missions because of our desire to achieve an end goal (such as running a VBS program or completing a construction project.) Here is the bitter truth: sometimes missionary work will not show immediate fruit. It might take years before you see one person coming to faith in Christ. So here, I challenge you to think, who are you not stretching your hand out to? Who are you not willing to touch? When I ask who, think of everyone you encounter - yes, everyone. As we learn more about what it means to live missionally, let us participate in the work that Jesus started and reach out in love to those we encounter in our daily lives.

A Life of Significance: Living in Light of Our God-Given Identity By Hannah Byun

In this world, we often define ourselves and find meaning in life by the things that we do. We feel like we must do something to make our lives special, or even, worthy. We essentially live our lives centered around ourselves, trying to gain recognition from others through the things we do. However, the perspective that we miss from living such a way is the inherent identity that we have in God. **Life is not made significant because of the things that we do, but because of the One who defines us.**

Jesus' sacrifice is a fundamental part of our identity as Christians. We must accept Jesus as our Saviour and believe in His crucifixion and resurrection to come to the Father. We find our true identity in Jesus because it is through Him that we received the right to become God's children, and it is in this truth that we find significance for our lives. As written in John 1:12, "to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God." We have a place in God's kingdom because **through Jesus Christ we adopt an identity that cannot be taken away from us – that we are God's children**. As human beings it is natural that we want to be recognized by others and want to be seen as an important person, but is such recognition so important when God calls us His own? There is no need to search for meaning in what we can accomplish because we can find all that we long for in Jesus. To search for our needs apart from Christ is like searching for water in a desert. Our true significance in life can only be found through Jesus Christ who revealed to us that God is our heavenly Father.

But what is it about being a child of God that makes our life so significant? The fact is that, **as His children, we all bear God's image.** It is written in Genesis 1:27, "God created man in his own image," which reminds us God has created all of us in His likeness. This makes our lives valuable because we were not made by just anybody, but we were made by the God who rules the universe. For example, a painting done by Vincent Van Gogh is said to have high artistic value and is often sold at millions of dollars. If a painting by a human artist has such high value, then, surely, the value of something made by the Creator of all things would have even greater value. So, knowing that we are God's creation and that He made us with care is the greatest thing that can bring significance to our lives.

Going further, God made us in His likeness to ultimately glorify Him. In Isaiah 43:7 God says of us, "everyone who is called by my name, whom I created <u>for my glory</u>, whom I formed and made." We were not made to enjoy life simply for ourselves, but we were designed to glorify and praise God. It is through glorifying God that our lives become truly significant because Scripture also reminds us of the consequences that follow if we worship anything other than God: "They worshipped worthless idols only to become worthless themselves" (Jeremiah 2:5).

When we search for joy in things apart from God, we lose sight of our God-given identity; we forget that life itself is a precious gift from God and that it already comes with great value because He has made us in His own image. So let us not waste our lives endlessly searching for meaning in our self-centeredness, but rather find our significance in our identity as God's children and glorify Him by reflecting His image through all that we do.
